

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Thomason-Scott House is a late Victorian cottage with Queen Anne/East-lake detailing. The one story frame structure is irregular in fenestration and plan, but is basically two rooms wide and three deep; it is typical of houses illustrated in turn of the century architectural pattern books. While the structure has had minor additions, the original house and its architectural detailing remain substantially undisturbed.

The entrance (north) front of the house consists of a center front door and side window, both sheltered by the front porch, and a double window with hood supported by triangular Eastlake brackets on the shallow northeast ell. The hip roof of the porch is supported by turned posts with fan-like brackets; a small lateral gable with fishscale shingles defines the entrance. The posts are joined by a Chinese Chippendale balustrade, unusual for the area. The larger lateral gable over the double window features octagonal fishscale shingles; its vergeboard has bullseye corner blocks and beaded boards similar to architraves found inside the house. The structure is covered by bevel siding and a large hip roof with gables; a small plain balustrade runs east-west along the ridge of the roof.

The east side of the house has irregular fenestration and the roof is broken by two lateral gables similar to that on the north front. The porch too is similar in detailing to that on the entrance facade, although large sections were filled in thirty years ago. The west side of the house has has three bays and one lateral gable, while the rear (south) side of the house, originally a porch, has also been partially infilled.

The north (front) door has heavy Eastlake detailing and beveled glass, and leads into the entrance hall. Interior doors have transomes and the type of corner blocks and beaded architraves found on the vergeboards of the exterior lateral gables. Bronze hardware is used throughout the front portion of the house. Noteworthy interior features include two sets of 9' sliding wood doors (one surmounted by decorative lattice work); two elaborate period mantelpieces; a built-in china cabinet in the original dining (center west) room; and a raised medicine chest in the center east bedroom for the supplies of the structure's first occupant, a doctor. The stained glass back door and the bulk of the period lighting fixtures in the house have been added recently; infilling of the porches occurred about 1948 and after 1974. As is evident in a comparison of the photos, other alterations include covering the wood shingles, removal of the chimneys in 1948 and the bricks used to construct the brick and iron porches, change in paint colors, and simplification of the roof cresting. Replacing the chimneys is the only change proposed at present, but all these alterations would seem to be reversible.

Of six known outbuildings, only the smokehouse and barn survive. They should be considered as contributing to the significance of the site.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Thomason-Scott House is a good example of the type of late Victorian cottage once prevalent in Texas towns, and, while the structure has had minor additions, the 1894 building remains largely unaltered and well preserved. It has been of significance in the village of Era since its construction, and is now the most prominent Victorian building surviving in that community. The Thomason-Scott House is also noteworthy as the home of Judge Robert Ewing Thomason, eminent legislator and jurist.

The house was constructed for Dr. Benjamin Richard Thomason and his second wife, Mary Maupin Thomason. Dr. Thomason, formerly a resident of Bedford County, Tennessee, had come to the town of Era shortly after its founding is 1878, and he was the first physician in that part of the county. The builder of the Thomason House was George Brumbaugh who, according to tradition, was sent by his family as a young man to Europe to study medicine but instead took up carpentry. The structure doubled as home for Dr. and Mrs. Thomason and their five children, and as Dr. Thomason's office. After the doctor's death in 1909, his widow sold the house. It became the home of Mr. and Mrs, Lester August Scott in 1948, and it is now owned by the Scotts' son and daughter-in-law, who have worked for six years on a restoration/ren ovation of the house.

The most prominent occupant of the house was Judge Robert Ewing Thomason (1878-1973), Dr. Thomason's eldest child. In his memoirs, Thomason, The Autobiography of a Federal Judge, Judge Thomason recalled having hauled from Gainesville every stick of lumber that went into our new home at Era, which house still stands and is the best one in the city." Following his graduation from the University of Texas Law School, Ewing Thomason began his long and distinguished career as a public servant. He was elected County (now District) Attorney of Cooke County (1903-07). He moved to El Paso in 1912 and there was elected to the Texas Legislature. He served as Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives (1918-1920), Mayor of El Paso (1927-1931) and Representative of the Sixteenth District of Texas to the U.S. Congress (1931-1947). During World War II he was second ranking member of the Military Committee of the House, and played an important part in shaping the military policy of the nation. In 1947 Congressman Thomason was nominated by President Truman and later confirmed by the U.S. Senate in the position of U.S. District Judge for the Western District, and he served in that capacity for many years.

Judge Thomason's daughter, Mrs. Isabelle Thomason Dechard, is a former president of the Dallas County Heritage Society, and has long been interested in historic preservation. Noting the significance of her grandfather's home as representative of its date and locale, Mrs. Dechard further remarked "It is remarkable that no major alterations have been made to the house in its eighty-five years... It seems fitting that the Thomason-Scott House be recognized as a material witness to the character of the citizenry of the community past and present."


