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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hagemann House at 3301 Avenue L in Galveston is a two story wood frame residence erected in 1892-93. Exhibiting elements of both Victorian Italianate and Queen Anne styles, the structure is distinguished by an unusual, by Galveston standards, wrap-around porch with ogee curve roof. Retaining much of its late 19th century fabric and character, the house stands in excellent condition and remains virtually unaltered.

Situated at the southwest corner of Avenue L and 33rd street, the Hagemann House is located just two blocks south of Broadway Boulevard within a neighborhood of mostly late 19th and early 20th century residences. A number of large and impressive houses in varying degrees of condition and alteration, line this portion of 33rd street. However, the Hagemann House stands out because of its good state of repair and virtually unaltered exterior. The house features an asymmetrical plan, balloon frame construction, and clapboard siding and rests upon a brick pier foundation with lattice panels. A two story wood frame carriage house stands at the southeast corner of the lot and faces east onto 33rd street. Although historically associated with the main house, this structure has been converted into a private residence and sold to another individual. As a result, it is not included in the property to be nominated.

The front elevation faces north onto Avenue L and is highlighted with a one story wrap-around porch. No doubt the house's most noteworthy architectural feature, this veranda displays an ogee shaped metal roof and elaborate woodwork in the balustrade and porch frieze. The porch with its curved rafters extends across the entire front and wraps around slightly projecting wings on the east and west elevations. Turned posts with brackets and pendants support the porch. These pillars are linked with a handrail pierced with semi-circular arches and turned balusters. The openwork porch frieze is comprised of turned wood members in vertical and crossed patterns. With detailing similar to the porch balustrade, a small balcony rises from the ogee porch just above the front, double door entrance.

The east elevation also remains virtually unaltered and, as previously noted, is highlighted with a section of the ogee roof porch. This side, however, displays lattice screens which provide protection from the morning sunlight yet allow ventilation from the constant sea breezes. The east elevation as well as the other walls are pierced with 1/1 wood sash windows and retain the original and still operable wood shutters.

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The rear (south) and west elevations have been slightly altered. The ground level porches of both sides have been enclosed to provide additional interior space and are sheathed with wood shutters. Nevertheless, these minor alterations do not detract from the historic character of the house and reflect a desire by the owners to maintain the structure's integrity. The only other evident exterior alteration is a small, lean-to greenhouse addition onto the south side of the one story rear kitchen wing.

The two story residence is capped with a multi-hipped roof of composition shingles. The roof extends well beyond the broad frieze and molded cornice. Brackets support these eaves and are placed in rhythm with the second level openings.

The interior of the Hagemann House has been refurbished and, like the exterior, remains in excellent condition. All public rooms such as the library, dining room, and kitchen are located on the first floor, while the house's bedrooms are upstairs. The double door front entrance with its etched glass ornamentation opens onto the two tiered entry hallway. Dominating this hall, a stairway turns a 45° angle at each of the two landings and is comprised of turned wood balusters and newel posts. The living room immediately east of the entry hall displays molding and trim typical of the Victorian era. The present library was originally the formal dining room but has been modified with the addition of book shelves and a wood and tile mantel around a newly installed fireplace. This mantel was saved from the present owner's great grandfather's farm house in Falls County, Texas which was razed in the 1950s. The original kitchen has been converted into an informal dining room while the rear enclosed porch has been made into a modern kitchen. A steep staircase provides access to the third floor bedroom, formerly used as attic space.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Hagemann House represents a good example of a transitional Italianate-Queen Anne style residence in Galveston and is particularly noteworthy for its wrap-around veranda with ogee curve roof. This uncommon ogee shaped roof is, perhaps, the only illustration of its kind in Galveston, a city well known for its eclectic, Victorian era architecture. John Hagemann, a prosperous grocer and produce merchant of the late 1800s, contracted Richard Zincke to build the house in 1892. The two story wood frame residence stands today in excellent condition with only minor alterations to its original appearance.

The structure exhibits a combination of two architectural styles popular during the late 19th century in Galveston. The hip roof and broad eaves with supportive brackets demonstrate an Italianate influence upon the house. On the other hand, the asymmetrical plan and the ornate woodwork exhibited in the porch are characteristic of Queen Anne style residences, thus creating a stylistic hybrid. The house's porch with ogee curve roof is its most distinctive architectural feature and may possibly be the only example of its kind in the city.

City directories indicate that John Hagemann lived and worked as a grocer on the north side of Avenue I (Sealy) between Bath (25th) and 26th streets during the late 1870s and 1880s. Like many other businessmen of Galveston of that era, Hagemann's operations soon expanded, and by 1889 he had relocated his business onto the Strand, Galveston's commercial hub and, at that time, Texas' most important financial center. (See Strand Historic District listed in the National Register.)

Hagemann soon decided to erect a fine residence to symbolize his wealth. He purchased lot seven and the eastern half of lot six of block thirty-three from John R. Gross. And on September 10, 1892, Hagemann contracted Richard Zincke to erect the house at 3301 Avenue L. Remaining in the Hagemann family until the 1920s, the house has since been owned by several other families. Fortunately, the house has changed little since its completion, and it still retains much of its original integrity. The present owners purchased the house in 1974, and have completely refurbished the house.
