### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Fort Worth Main Post Office Building, located on the southeast corner of Jennings and Lancaster avenues in downtown Fort Worth, Texas, is an impressive structure that has provided postal services to Fort Worth citizens since 1933. Designed with three floors and a basement, a four-level reinforced concrete structure spans the entire city block upon which it is located. It is arguably the most significant Beaux Arts/Classical Revival building in Fort Worth.

The United States Post Office is a massive, three-story, rectangular structure with a cut-limestone exterior. The flat roof above the second floor is surrounded by a narrow, U-shaped, third floor whose roof appears hipped to the north, east and west. A tall parapet crowns the south facade.

The principal (north) facade consists of a 17-bay central block and end pavilions. The central block's most noteworthy features are its 16 giant-order unfluted columns with extraordinary Corinthian-inspired capitals of shorthorn cattle (in place of volutes), acanthus leaves, and a longhorn bucranium central part. Columns are surrounded by bronze medallions incorporated into the entablature, which in turn has what appears to be freestanding anthemias above. Repeating lion's heads on the architrave encircle the building, and ornamental bas-relief panels further embellish sections of the main facade.

Multipane metal casement windows with generally 28 panes on the main floor and 16 on the basement level and second floor puncture the facade. Corner pavilions with large doors at ground level and three eight-pane windows are placed at each end.

The east and west fronts generally repeat the architectural vocabulary of the main facade. The windows of the seven-bay central section are separated by pilasters adapted from the front columns. These are flanked by similar entrances with three windows above, and terminate at the corner pavilions with three windows placed above large bas-relief panels.

The rear (south) of the building is somewhat simpler. The 17-bay central section with doors at ground level and windows above has neither columns nor pilasters, but relies on the continuing entablature as the chief architectural motif. A covered loading dock south of the Post Office is apparently original to the design of the complex, and opens towards the Texas and Pacific railroad tracks.

There are four main entrances to the first floor: one at the northeast corner facing north; one at the northeast corner facing east; one at the northwest corner facing north; and one at the northwest corner facing west. A customer-service area with service windows, administrative service offices, file rooms, a vault, and the postmaster's public and private offices are located along the north side of the main floor, along the entire space between the two doors that open to the north.

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The major public postal lobby forms an elongated gallery lined with marble from Tennessee, Vermont, and Texas, and is 22 feet wide, running the entire length of the building. On the north side, facing Lancaster Avenue, are the offices of the postmaster and other executives which retain their original decorative features, while the service windows and large mail-handling work room are on the south side of the lobby. Spaced the length of this gallery-lobby are six glass-topped writing tables resting on open-work bronze supports. The partitions on each side of the lobby are lined with tan marble to a height of eight feet, with green marble pilasters spaced regularly, and above that is a bronze grill reaching to the ceiling 25 feet above. Composing the bronze grill are sculptural groups incorporating the United States Eagle perched on each side of the U.S. Shield. The only evident change in the public area is the closure of a few service windows. Grills, tables, post office boxes, and other original features are considered furnishings by the U.S. Postal Service. The ceiling is divided by cross beams and decorated in functional ornamental sculptured plaster, with gold leaf and green used freely for artistic effect. Pendant lamps with frosted glass globes are suspended from the ceiling at each end of the gallery. The general mail work rooms have a hardwood parquet floor made of the end blocks of 2" x 4"s. The interior is maintained very well.

Approximately three-fourths of the first floor is used for mailhandling operations, with a mailing platform spanning the south side of the structure and with truck passage space provided. On the second floor are located offices and conference rooms, locker rooms, snack rooms, and toilet facilities. On the third floor there are supply rooms, training rooms, storage rooms, and an air handling unit. In the basement area there are training facilities, personnel offices, assembly areas, locker rooms, plant maintenance offices, and storage for supplies.

There have been no major changes to the structure at any time, and its integrity remains intact. The building is located at the southern end of the central business district and is surrounded by highways and railroad structures.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

During the 1930s, the construction of massive public buildings began to make a notable impact on the Texas urban landscape. The Fort Worth Main Post Office exemplifies the huge Neo-Classical buildings evidently preferred by the federal government at the time. Its large scale is balanced by many fine classically inspired details, some of which were interpreted to appeal to local interests; heads of longhorns and shorthorn cattle add a note of levity to the otherwise stern facade. The structure has been a source of pride to the citizens of Fort Worth for more than half a century.

Fort Worth has had postal service since the fort from which the city took its name was established in the mid-nineteenth century. All earlier post offices have been demolished, leaving the massive 1931 Beaux Arts structure nominated herein with the longest continuous association with mail delivery in the county.

Because of the community's growth and the need for expanded postal facilities, in 1931 the federal government purchased a tract of land from the Texas and Pacific Railroad Company for \$200,000 on which to construct a new post office building. Its location adjacent to the Texas and Pacific Railway Station was expected to improve service, since most of the incoming and outgoing mail would be handled by the railroads that used that station. Groundbreaking for the planned \$1,245,000 building took place on August 11, 1931, with the construction work being done by Ralph Sollitt and Sons, a Chicago contracting firm.

The new post office building was designed by the firm of Wyatt C. Hedrick, a nationally known architect-engineer. A native of Chatham, Virginia, Hedrick came to Texas and established himself at Houston and Fort Worth. He owned the W.D. Hedrick Construction Company from 1914 to 1922, at which time he became a partner with the noted firm of Sanguinett, Staats, and Hedrick, Architects and Engineers. Later he purchased the firm from his associates. At the time he secured the bid to design the Fort Worth Main Post Office Building, Hedrick had an associate, J.J. Patterson, who participated in drawing up the plans. Appropriately, Hedrick had been selected to design the neighboring Texas and Pacific Railroad Terminal Building, which was completed in 1931. Hedrick's style of architecture for the two structures assured that

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a harmonious architectural district was to be enjoyed by Fort Worth citizens. The selection of a prominent local architect was significant, as most Texas post offices of the period appear to have been constructed from standard Department of the Treasury designs.

The formal opening of the Fort Worth Post Office Building occurred on February 22, 1933, George Washington's birthday. Activities on the opening day were limited to the delivery of mail through the rented boxes, as it was an official holiday. A few weeks later, on April 9, 1933, a unique dedication ceremony held by the Julia Jackson Chapter #141, United Daughters of the Confederacy, received special attention. That date was chosen for its historical significance, being the 65th anniversary of the date Gen. Robert E. Lee surrendered his forces at Appomattox, Virginia. The tablet, which symbolized the reunification of the United States of America, was placed inside the front northwest entrance of the building, and reads, "Dedicated to the Confederate Veterans by the UDC and SCV, Fort Worth, Texas, 1933."

The architecture of the United States Post Office is of considerable note locally. While 1930s post offices are sometimes the most significant classical buildings in small Texas towns, it is unusual for that to be the case in one of the largest cities in the state. The United States Post Office, however, is arguably the most substantial Beaux Arts/Classical Revival building in Fort Worth. The very rich main lobby, the northern monumental facade, and even the cow-head capitals make the U.S. Post Office unique in Fort Worth.

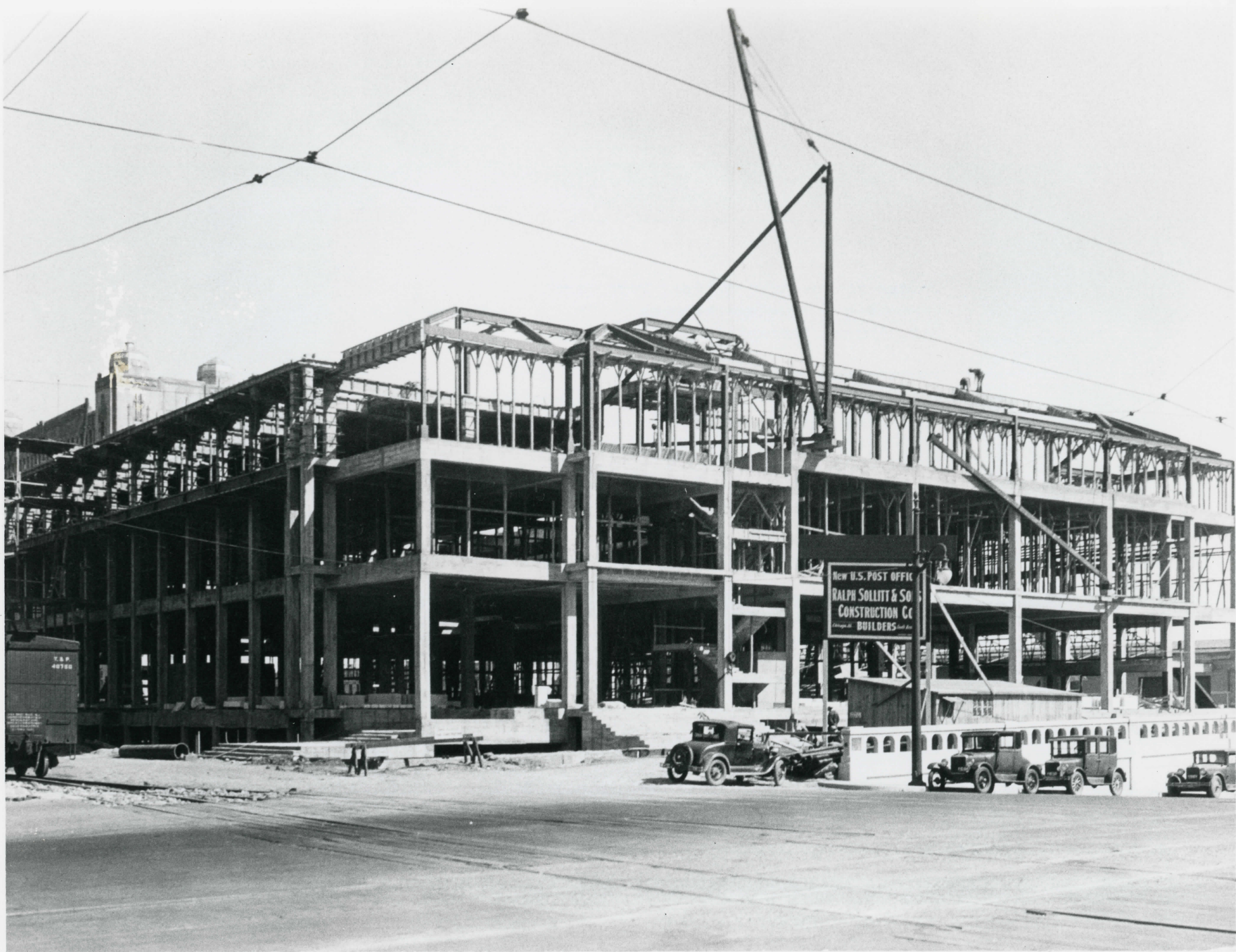

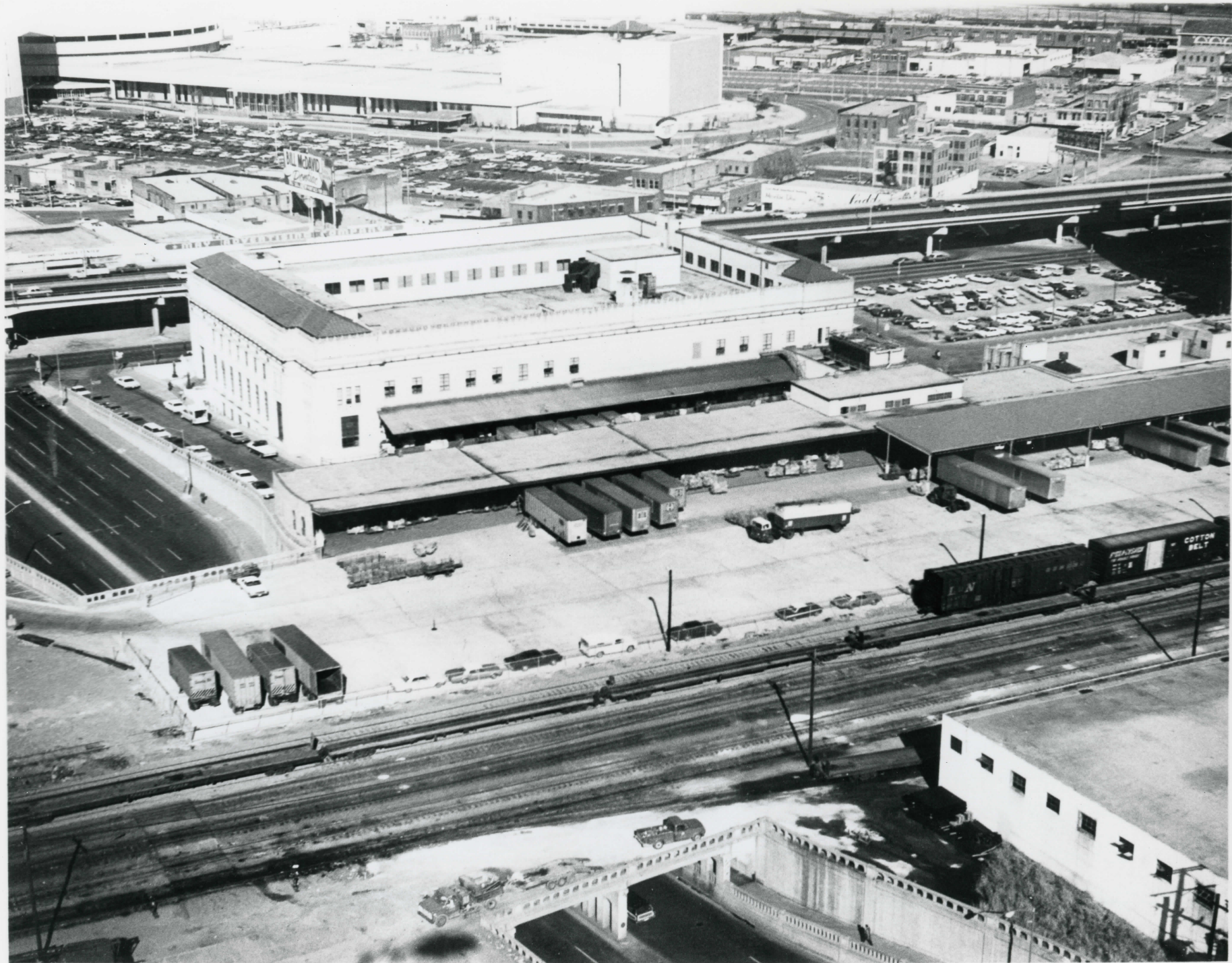

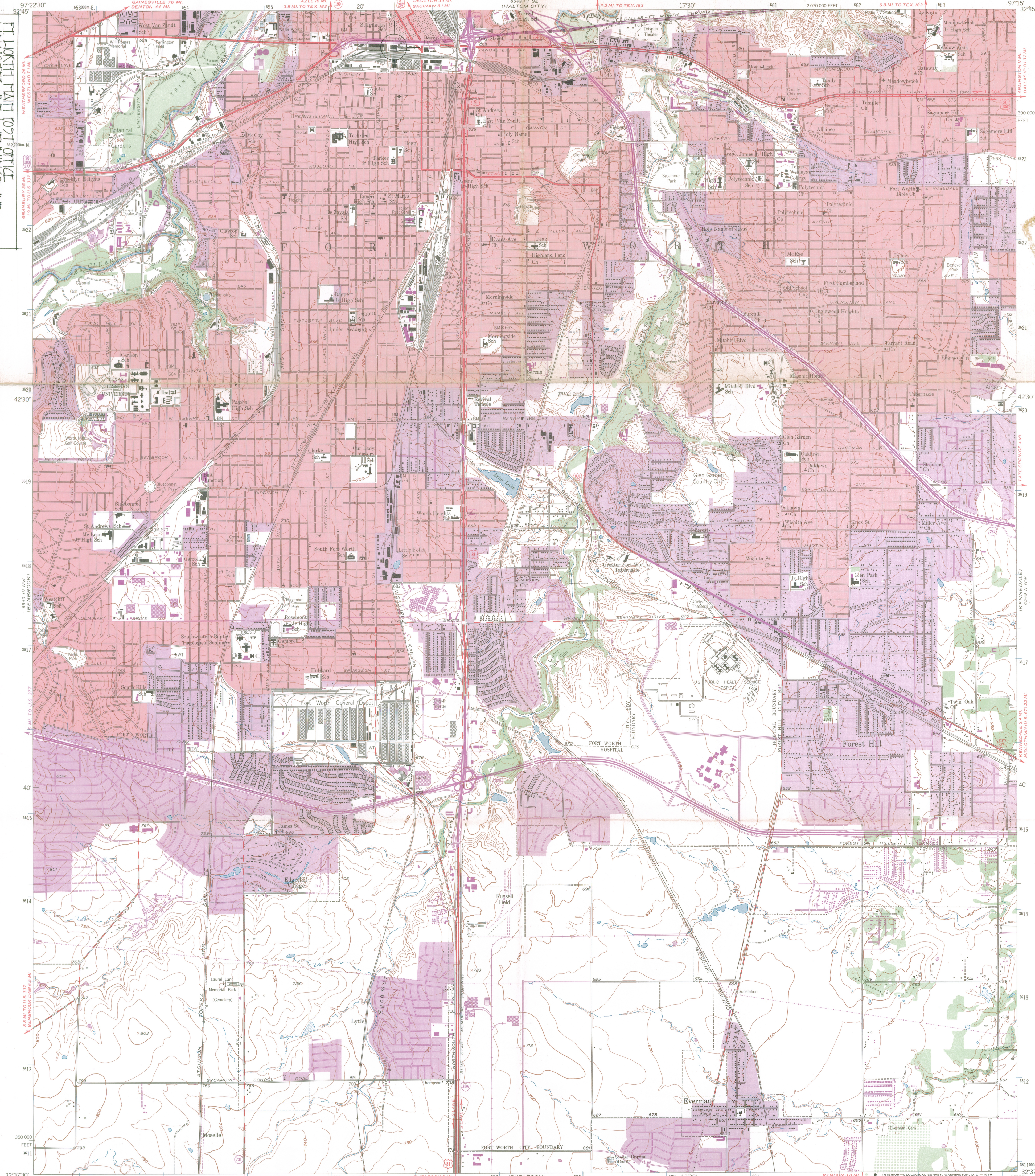
