The Silas and Ellen Baggett House is a 2 1/2-story, exuberant Queen Anne style wood frame house with a projecting chamfered bay and corner tower. It is a mirror image of the Ele Baggett House across North Main and takes a similar form to the Morey House on the same street. It faces east on a large lot in a neighborhood of late 19th- and early 20th-century houses in North Belton. Numerous large deciduous trees and shrubs surround the house.

The Baggett House is based on a modified L-plan with a projecting wing on the northeast facade and a square tower on the southeast corner. The main roof mass is hipped with multiple gables projecting over the wings and bays of the house. The principal facade is asymmetrically composed with a large 2-story gallery at the center, flanked on either side by a gabled wing and bell-roofed tower. An ornate gabled dormer projects centrally from the roof above the gallery. The primary wall finish is weatherboard, but decorative shingles and milled trim are heavily used in the Queen Anne fashion. The windows are 2/2 double hung with wood frames. The bay and tower have art glass windows on the first floor. The main entry has a transom and ornamental hood mold and the various gables are decorated with typical Queen Anne sunburst or fishscale ornament. A small outbuilding on the site is considered Noncontributing.

The Silas and Ellen Baggett House, together with the Ele Baggett House, illustrates the use of stock house plans and patternbooks in the construction of ornate late-Victorian middle class houses. The house was probably built in the early 1890s and is one of the best surviving examples of the Queen Anne style in Belton. Contextually the property relates to Community and Regional Development, specifically to the growth and prosperity of Belton as a result of the cattle boom after the Civil War. The house is eligible for listing in the National Register under Criterion C, significant in the area of Architecture, as one of the finest and most intact Queen Anne style houses in the city.

The Silas and Ellen Baggett House was built about 1890 for local cattle baron and businessman Silas Baggett and his wife. Baggett (1822-1897) arrived in Bell County before the Civil War and bought a large parcel of land near Howard, approximately five miles northwest of Temple. The ranch became a stopping point on the north-south stage route and the Chisholm trail which ran near the property. After the Civil War, Baggett and his two sons Ele and Monroe, organized cattle drives to Kansas and Montana. With the profits earned from this and other ventures, Baggett built this large home. His son Ele built a house which is almost a mirror image of it across the street.

The Silas and Ellen Baggett House exemplifies the prosperity of Belton during the 1880s and '90s related to ranching and the display of wealth made by the cattle barons in the construction of their residences. It also illustrates the increased use of patternbooks and marketed house plans as the basis for Queen Anne houses. The design of the two Baggett Houses suggests the work of George F. Barber and other architects selling plans at the time through published catalogues. Likely it is the work of a local builder who was familiar with such publications and probably borrowed floor plans and design motifs from them.
