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The Woodman of the World (W.O.W.) Building is a 3-story brick commercial building that is classified as a two-part commercial block. Like most structures in downtown Nacogdoches, it utilizes a rectangular plan and has load-bearing masonry construction with brick exterior walls. The building is distinguished by its massive scale, which is accentuated by the small 1-story structures that adjoin it to the east and west, and its strong vertical expression. It occupies two lots on the south side of the 400 block of W. Main Street.

The two-part commercial block is a subtype of commercial building which is identified by two distinct zones on the facade and the W.O.W. Building is a good example of this popular form. The front, which faces north onto W. Main Street, has a darker, more expensive brick than that used on the other walls. Such a practice was common during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The ground floor has a central, single-door entrance that apparently leads to a stairwell. The storefronts on either side of the central bay have large display windows and offcenter single-door entrances. A band of fixed-light transoms with vertical muntins extends above the display windows and doors. The upper section of the two-part commercial block, which includes both the second and third floors, has slightly projecting piers at the center and at each corner. The windows, in contrast to the large display windows on the ground floor, are double hung with 3/1 or 4/1 lights and vertical muntins that subtly reinforce the structure's verticality. Exceptions are the stairwell windows which have either single panes or sashes with a simple geometric design. The parapet displays a variety of finely crafted masonry work including slightly inset panels with T-shaped projecting motifs. A stepped three-part parapet crowns the central bay while similar but smaller parapets rise above the end bays.

The structure occupies property to the south which gives the building extra floor space to the rear. Few physical changes apparently have taken place, and the building retains much of its integrity and character. The structure is in good condition. 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The Woodmen of the World building at 412 E. Main was erected about 1923, and is an outstanding and remarkably well-preserved example of a commercial building in Nacogdoches. It is nominated to the National Register under Criterion C for its architectural merits because it retains its integrity to a noteworthy degree and it is an outstanding local example of early 20th century commercial architecture. The building was built when Nacogdoches' downtown expanded outward from the square along E. Main Street and, therefore, is associated with the *Community Planning and Development in Nacogdoches: 1830-1940*.

An outgrowth of the city's rapid expansion during the late 19th and early 20th centuries resulted in the formation of a variety of social and fraternal organizations. The local chapter of the Woodmen of the World, which was organized in 1908, is representative of this trend. By 1919 its members decided to erect their own lodge and they chose a downtown location to be near the center of public and commercial activity. In 1921 members organized a Building Committee to secure the funds for the new lodge and they voted to proceed at the earliest practical time to draw up the necessary plans and specifications for its construction. By September 1922, the Building Committee had raised over \$20,000 for the construction of a 3-story brick building and soon began construction. They hired Moore Construction Company to erect the structure at a cost of \$15,656.00 and contracted with R. W. Parrish to provide the woodwork for \$10,000 (Nacogdoches County Deed Records 105:537). The third floor was used exclusively for lodge purposes, while the first and second floors were leased to various businesses. The leased spaces were possibly seen as a way to provide income to cover lodge expenses. The Woodmen of the World continued to meet at this site until 1975 when a new lodge was built on the eastern side of the city limits.

The 3-story structure, one of the largest in the downtown, is a prominent local landmark. The architecture of the W.O.W. building is most noted for its strong vertical expression. This is established by the use of 3-story piers on each corner and in the center bay that rise to a stepped parapet, and the vertical muntins found on all windows. The scale of the W.O.W. building is further highlighted by the 1-story surrounding commercial buildings. An awning suspended above the vertical transoms (now removed) probably served to maintain a horizontal streetscape for the pedestrian. Unlike most buildings nearby, it remains virtually unaltered and is among the most outstanding examples of early 20th-century commercial architecture in Nacogdoches.


