

Description

Building 1040 is a sprawling, multi-use building that is just north of the intersection of Enterprise Street and Independence Street, near the heart of NAS Chase Field. The front, which has a 3-part composition, faces southeast onto Enterprise Street where an unadorned awning extends across much of the facade. The building's footprint is shaped like an "L" and includes a large rear extension containing the gym. The auditorium is between the gym and the chapel, which includes the southwest portion of the building. The property has a concrete foundation and wood-frame construction that is covered with galbestos siding. The surrounding land is flat, with minimal plantings and landscape features. Although it does not have any stylistic ornamentation, Building 1040 is distinctive from other historic properties at the base because of its barrel-vaulted gym and its expansive plan. The property is in good condition and has had very little alteration to its exterior since its construction.

Building 1040 originally housed an auditorium, gym and chapel within a single edifice. Located in the northwest quadrant of the original grouping of buildings, the structure stands near the intersection of Enterprise and Independence streets. The grounds have grass lawns with the exception of a small parking lot on the northeastern edge of the building. Galbestos siding covers the exterior of the one-story building, which utilizes wood-frame construction. The building footprint is irregular but is roughly L-shaped in form.

The front faces southeast towards Enterprise Street. The most distinctive feature of the front is the three-part composition, with the barrel-vaulted roof over the gym to the northeast, a one-story auditorium in the middle, and the two-story chapel to the southwest. A 16-bay, shed-roof porch with square posts extends across the front. Both casement and fixed windows are used, and double-door entrances open from the chapel and gym sections of the building.

The interior of the gym contains wood-arched trusses and hardwood floors. Banking facilities were incorporated into the building in 1973, and additional rooms for Jewish and Catholic worshipers were completed in 1975 and 1976, respectively. Building 1040 continued as a recreational, social and religious center at NAS Chase Field until 1993 when the Navy closed the entire base.

Statement of Significance

Building 1040, the Auditorium/Gym/Chapel, is a product of the enormous military construction program that built a network of naval aviation and auxiliary air stations to train pilots and crewmen for active duty during World War II. Built in 1943, during the initial period of construction at NAS Chase Field, the Auditorium/Gym/Chapel was a creative response to the war emergency conditions that restricted materials and labor for non-essential military construction. By combining three different types of support activities in a single facility, the Navy saved time, expense and, most importantly for the war effort, materials. As a result, the building has an unusual appearance but one that uniquely expresses the priorities of the auxiliary air station's mission during the war years. The building relates to Chase Field: A World War II Naval Auxiliary Air Station, 1943-1946 and to the statewide context, U.S. Military 1919-1945.

The Auditorium/Gym/Chapel derives its significance from its historical association with Chase Field during the World War period and is therefore nominated to the National Register of Historic Places at the local level of significance under Criterion A. The Auditorium/Gym/Chapel is among the base's most unique buildings because its design encompasses a variety of functions and activities. Although built as a single edifice, the building acts as three separate units adjoined to one another. Typical pre-war and National Defense period training stations had separate gym, chapel and auditorium facilities but under the war-emergency conditions that prevailed during the construction of NAS Chase Field, such facilities were a lower priority. By combining several different functions within a single complex, the Navy saved resources needed for more direct, military-related construction.

Drawings for the Auditorium/Gym/Chapel were provided by Robert & Company, an Atlanta-based architectural and engineering firm that designed most of the buildings at NAS Chase Field and NAS Corpus Christi. The Houston-based consortium of Brown Bellows & Columbia served as general contractor for the project. In keeping with the austerity policy followed by the Bureau of Yards and Docks after 1942, the building is of temporary, frame construction and was intended to serve only for the duration of the war.

Although the Auditorium/Gym/Chapel was not critical to the actual training of Navy cadets, it played an important supportive role that contributed to the overall base mission. While construction projects directly linked to military objectives took precedence over such support facilities, the Navy recognized the vital role of recreation, socialization and religion, in maintaining the physical, mental and spiritual well-being of its personnel under the




exacting conditions engendered by the world war (U.S. Bureau of Yards and Docks 1947: 269).

The Auditorium/Gym/Chapel represents the type of Spartan support facilities approved for bases under the stringent construction guidelines imposed by World War II. Unlike most other historic resources at NAS Chase Field, the Auditorium/Gym/Chapel defies classification within a single Property Type category because, in effect, it is three buildings incorporated into one. This configuration makes the property an uncommon and distinctive building form at NAS Chase Field. Despite its unique form, the building is not particularly noteworthy for its architectural merits. Although banking facilities have been added, the building appears much as it did when originally completed in 1943. Because it is relatively unchanged, it evokes a strong visual sense of the World War II period in which it was constructed. Its significance stems primarily from its close association with the naval auxiliary air station and to the successful pursuance of naval objectives during World War II.
