The Robinson Bank Building at 215 W. Main is a brick commercial building, classified as a 1part commercial block. Located near the center of Palestine's historic downtown, the 1-story building features Romanesque Revival detailing and a rectangular plan with load-bearing masonry construction. Because it shares party walls with adjoining properties to the east and west, the south elevation is the building's only public exposure. This 3-bay facade displays elaborate and finely crafted brickwork. Distinctive architectural elements include the large round archway which marks the primary entrance and the stepped, 3-part parapet with corbeling. The building remains in good condition and has changed little since its original construction, thus retaining its integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association to a high degree.

The Robinson Bank Building sits on relatively level land, just above street grade. The building occupies a narrow commercial lot in the middle of the 200 block of W. Main within the downtown area. A concrete sidewalk extends across the front of the building and there are no plantings or vegetation on the property. The building's footprint, like most commercial property in downtown Palestine, is rectangular and the brick walls are load-bearing. The parapet obscures the roof type and roofing materials, but most commercial properties in downtown Palestine have flat or slightly inclined roofs covered with built-up tar and gravel.

The front of the building faces south onto W. Main Street and exhibits ornate Romanesque Revival detailing. The large round-arch opening dominates the south elevation and defines the middle bay of the facade's 3-part configuration. The arch features a large keystone and red bricks that contrast with the buff-colored brick walls. Under the arch, two doors flanked by fixed transoms and capped with a fanlight provide primary access into the building. A large masonry pier with stucco finish divides this central bay into two sections. The outer bays, on either side of the entrance, are virtually identical. Each has a set-back panel with stucco finish at the base, a single display window, and a large multi-light transom. A flat arch with a keystone caps each of these openings. The parapet consists of both red- and buff-colored brick and features a 3-part stepped composition. Brick piers with corbeled bases define the central portion above the round arch, while a decorative garland band extends across the mid-section of this bay, and corbeled brickwork caps the top. The outer portions of the parapet also feature corbeled brick and brick piers at each end. A metal and neon sign extends from the facade in the westernmost bay.

Although the building is currently not in use, it is in good condition and retains many of its original architectural features. Exterior alterations have been confined largely to the entrance and the base of the building. The original doors have been replaced, and a layer of stucco has been applied over the original exterior finish. The sign protruding from the front of the building is not original; however, it is an important physical feature and has gained significance in its own right. The sign identifies one of the property's varied functions and also provides insight into the historic signage of commercial properties.

The Robinson Bank Building is a tangible link to the rapid commercial expansion created by the entrance of the railroad into Palestine in the late 19th century. Since its construction in 1890, the Robinson Bank Building has housed numerous businesses, but the most significant was the Robinson Bank, an early banking institution in Palestine. The Robinson Bank, which operated under various names throughout its existence, occupied the building until the operation merged with the Royall National Bank in 1937. The building is an outstanding example of a Romanesque Revival commercial building and is nominated to the National Register within the context of *Community and Regional Development in Palestine: 1846-1945*. The building is significant at the local level under Criterion A in the area of Commerce and under Criterion C in the area of Architecture.

Palestine remained a relatively small community in East Texas throughout the middle of the 19th century; however, the International & Great Northern Railroad spurred tremendous growth and prosperity after extending its line through Palestine in 1872. As commerce and trade expanded, entrepreneurs started new businesses to accommodate this growth and began to construct buildings in New Town, which soon developed into Palestine's primary commercial center. The Robinson Bank Building exemplifies this trend.

Although the building on W. Main Street dates to 1890, Dr. James Isaac Bonner and William Brice Robinson founded the institution responsible for its construction about a decade earlier. Around 1880, Bonner and Robinson opened a public banking facility in nearby Palestine. According to one source, the Moody family of Galveston encouraged them to open a banking house. "It was under their guidance that the Bonner and Robinson Bank was organized. . . . The Moodys felt very strongly that the railroad center needed the banking facility" (Thornton n.d.:147). Originally, the bank was called Bonner & Robinson, Bankers, and Dealers in Exchange, and occupied a building in Palestine's bustling downtown.

The business flourished and in 1890 new construction began on the Romanesque Revival building on Main Street (the original location of the bank is not known). At first, Robinson was the principal manager of the bank. Following the death of Bonner around 1900, Robinson's younger brothers (G.S. Robinson and Z. Lee Robinson) and sister (Margaret Robinson Boulware) came to Palestine from their native South Carolina to assist with the bank's operation. At this point, each became an officer of the bank and they renamed the institution Robinson Brothers, Bankers.

Z. Lee Robinson assumed control of the bank after his brother and bank co-founder William Robinson died on April 25, 1905. G.S. Robinson II, William Robinson's grandson, served as manager. Around 1920 the name changed to Robinson Guaranty State Bank & Trust Company, and eight years later it changed again, this time to Robinson State Bank & Trust Company. Throughout the period in which the building housed a banking operation, the business' moniker has always included the Robinson name. For this reason, the building is simply called the Robinson Bank Building.

On December 30, 1937, the bank merged with Royall National Bank, which Nathaniel R. Royall founded in Palestine in 1904. Z. Lee Robinson and Guy Thornwell Robinson, son of W.B. Robinson, became officers of Royall National Bank, which today is one of the largest banks in the city. All banking operations were moved from the Romanesque Revival building on Main Street and a variety of businesses have since occupied the space. The best known business was the Rushing Jewelry Store, which placed the existing, prominent neon sign on the facade.

The Robinson Bank Building is one of Palestine's most intact historic commercial buildings and a noteworthy example of a 1-part commercial block. As one of the best-preserved buildings in the downtown area, the Robinson Bank Building displays superb craftsmanship and maintains its historic character to an unusually high degree. The round arched entrance and corbeled brick parapet exemplify the Romanesque Revival style. This architectural expression gained considerable popularity in Palestine and other downtown areas in Texas during the late 19th century, and the Robinson Bank Building gains significance as the city's premier commercial example of the Romanesque Revival style.
